EQLS | Simplify Market Neutral Equity Long/Short ETF

FUND OVERVIEW

The **Simplify Market Neutral Equity Long/Short ETF (EQLS)** seeks to provide positive absolute returns and income. A market-neutral strategy is one that seeks to profit during both rising and falling equity markets. By potentially profiting in either market environment, EQLS can provide significant diversification benefits while maintaining an independent source of returns.

The portfolio's equity ranking system is driven by a proprietary multi-factor, machine-learning stock selection model developed by an industry-leading quantitative research firm.

PERFORMANCE REVIEW

EQLS underwent a strategy enhancement in late 4Q24 by incorporating additional systematic models, increasing the volatility target, and adding additional leverage determined by research from the Wolfe Research partnership. These enhancements seek to increase diversification, provide greater exposure to U.S. stocks and provide potential for greater upside in performance.

EQLS had a negative absolute return of -2.80% for the quarter driven by a sizeable outflow, stock selection, and country exposure. Positive exposure to the Momentum style factor was a key contributor to performance, while positive exposure to the Profitability style factor was a detractor. From a sector perspective, negative exposure to Energy was a drag while positive exposure to Financials was additive. Geographically, positive exposure to Sweden was a drag to performance.

DEFINITIONS

ICE BofA US 3-Month Treasury Bill Index: An unmanaged index that is comprised of a single U.S. Treasury issue with approximately three months to final maturity, purchased at the beginning of each month and held for one full month.

Market Price: The current price at which shares are bought and sold. Market returns are based upon the last trade price.

NAV: The dollar value of a single share, based on the value of the underlying assets of the fund minus its liabilities, divided by the number of shares outstanding. Calculated at the end of each business day.

Options: An option is a contract that gives the buyer the right to either buy (in the case of a call option) or sell (in the case of a put option) an underlying asset at a pre-determined price ("strike") by a specific date ("expiry"). An "outright" is another name for a single option leg. A "spread" is when options are bought at one strike and an equal amount of options are sold at a different strike, all at the same expiry.

SEC 30-Day Yield: The yield is calculated with a standardized formula and represents net investment income earned by a fund over a 30-day period, expressed as an annual percentage rate based on the fund's share price. The yield includes the effect of any fee waivers and/or reimbursements. Without waivers, yields would be reduced. This is also referred to as the "standardized yield", "30-Day Yield" and "Current Yield". The unsubsidized SEC 30-Day Yield does not reflect the effect of any fee waivers and/or expense reimbursements.

Volatility: A measure of how much and how quickly prices move over a given span of time.
