

SVOL | Simplify Volatility Premium ETF

FUND OVERVIEW

The **Simplify Volatility Premium ETF (SVOL)** seeks to provide investment results, before fees and expenses, that correspond to approximately one-fifth to three-tenths (-0.2x to -0.3x) the inverse of the performance of the Cboe Volatility Index (VIX) short-term futures index while also seeking to mitigate extreme volatility. SVOL aims to provide an attractive income stream and source of diversification while seeking to avoid risks inherent in other income-producing asset classes. The fund's short VIX position provides investors an optimized exposure for monetizing the premium in the VIX futures market. A modest option overlay budget is then deployed into VIX call options to help protect against adverse moves in VIX.

PERFORMANCE REVIEW

SVOL delivered a quarterly return of -1.65%, bringing its one-year performance to 7.17%. Despite this modest quarterly decline, the fund continues to demonstrate robust support for its distribution rate, albeit slightly below historical averages. Short positions in VIX futures contributed positively to performance, adding 1.18% as the VIX curve normalized during the period. Conversely, options strategies detracted 2.48%, while the bond portfolio further weighed on returns by -0.05%. Meanwhile, U.S. Treasury Bills contributed a positive 0.72% to overall performance.

Market dynamics in mid-December were notably volatile, with the VIX spiking from an average of 17.2 to a peak of 27.6 following Federal Reserve commentary hinting at limited rate cuts in 2025. By quarter-end, the index had stabilized back near its starting level around 17.

SVOL remains well-positioned to deliver higher income than a traditional covered call strategy, especially given the reduced premiums collected in a low-VIX landscape. We expect that allocations to fixed income securities and option overlays will continue to enhance portfolio yield, though slightly below historical levels, following the Federal Open Market Committee's (FOMC) rate cuts in the 4th quarter 2024.

DEFINITIONS

Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC): The branch of the Federal Reserve System that determines the direction of monetary policy.

Futures: Derivative financial contracts that obligate parties to buy or sell an asset at a predetermined future date and price. The buyer must purchase or the seller must sell the underlying asset at the set price, regardless of the current market price at the expiration date.

Market Price: The current price at which shares are bought and sold. Market returns are based upon the last trade price.

NAV: The dollar value of a single share, based on the value of the underlying assets of the fund minus its liabilities, divided by the number of shares outstanding. Calculated at the end of each business day.

Option: An option is a contract that gives the buyer the right to either buy (in the case of a call option) or sell (in the case of a put option) an underlying asset at a predetermined price ("strike") by a specific date ("expiry"). An "outright" is another name for a single option leg. A "spread" is when options are bought at one strike and an equal amount of options are sold at a different strike, all at the same expiry.

SEC 30-Day Yield: The yield is calculated with a standardized formula and represents net investment income earned by a fund over a 30-day period, expressed as an annual percentage rate based on the fund's share price. The yield includes the effect of any fee waivers and/or reimbursements. Without waivers, yields would be reduced. This is also referred to as the "standardized yield", "30-Day Yield" and "Current Yield". The unsubsidized SEC 30-Day Yield does not reflect the effect of any fee waivers and/or expense reimbursements.

S&P 500 Index: The index includes 500 leading U.S. large cap companies and captures approximately 80% coverage of the available market.

VIX Index: A real-time market index representing the market's expectations for volatility over the coming 30 days.
